Thunder Over NH Returns for 2023

PORTSMOUTH -

The 2023 Thunder Over New Hampshire Air Show will be thundering over the seacoast on Saturday, September 9 and Sunday, September 10. Produced by Herb Gillen Airshows, the annual event benefits the New Hampshire Military Assistance Foundation, a non-profit established in 2014 to support New Hampshire's military members and their families, particularly those of the National Guard. On each day, the Pease Air National Guard Base will open parking lots at 8 a.m., gates and ground displays at 9 a.m., with perfor-



mances 12-4 p.m., closing all at 5 p.m.

General admission for the show is free and does not require a ticket. However, every vehicle parking on site is required to obtain a free or paid parking pass in advance of the show (not avail-



able at the gate). A few premium parking passes are still available in the south lots. All free parking in the north lots has been sold out. New this year is a rideshare dropoff and bicycle parking location near the south gate in front of the Pease terminal building. A lim-



ited number of club memberships are also still available, providing a top-shelf show experience.

With more than 51 acres of space, "Patriot Plaza," presented by Service Credit Union, will host dozens of aircraft displays,

for kids of all ages, dining, concessions, souvenirs, commercial exhibits, and a Kidz Zone play

tient Center in the Pease Tradeport, 121 Corporate Drive, Portsmouth. There is also an option to run or walk a one-mile loop, or participate virtually from September 16-23. Runners and walkers of all ages can register online at www.seacoastcancer5k.org.

For the fifth consecutive year, NBC Sports color analyst and former Boston hoops favorite, Brian Scalabrine will be in attendance, serving as "Honorary Team Captain."

The funds raised are critical to underwrite the cancer center's supportive and wellness services, which offers integrative therapies and support that are often not covered by insurance. 'The loss of my vision quite literally made me walk by faith and not by sight, and forced me

to reevaluate my life," he wrote. He is now three years sober and proud to be part of the 2019 graduating class of the Carroll Center for the Blind. He also learned that by helping others, we take the focus off ourselves.

He wrote, "My long daily walks have helped me cope by clearing my mind and restoring some sense of freedom. Often, though, I'm stopped in my tracks before crossing Portsmouth's Memorial Bridge when it lifts for passing boats. I've dubbed



Museum to Display Original Drafts of U.S. Constitution

EXETER -

Generally stored in a special climate-controlled environment and not available for public viewing, two original working drafts of the U.S. Constitution will be on display at the American Independence Museum (AIM) on Saturday, September 16.

"These drafts have not been on public view since before the pandemic, so we are thrilled to bring them back to celebrate Constitution Day," said Jennifer Carr, executive director of AIM.

The first draft contains handwritten notes in the margins and is a copy of the initial version. The second draft, a seven-page document resembling a broadside, includes corrections and amendments made in iron gall ink by Captain Nicholas Gilman, who was a delegate to the Constitutional Convention in 1787.

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"The notes on the drafts reveal the thought process of the people who wrote the Constitution," said Carr. "This is an extraordinary opportunity to literally see history unfold before your eyes."

In addition to the public viewing of the drafts on September 16 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Ladd-Gilman House, AIM will also host Constitution Comic Workshops. Sponsored

by Ed and Barbara Wilson, the PORTSMOUTH workshops begin at 10 a.m. for educators, and 11:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. for families and children.

All events on that day are free, although a \$10 donation is encouraged. The mnuseum is located at 1 Governor's Lane. Exeter. For more information or to pre-register for the workshops, visit www.independencemuseum.org or call 603-772-2622.

Star Island Gosport Regatta

The event certainly had a colorful start in July of 1874. when it was organized by John Poor, president of the Stickney & Poor Spice Trading Co., to celebrate the grand opening of his Star Island Oceanic Hotel. It attracted more than 50 boats, among them "America," the yacht for which the legendary America's Cup is named. It was America's first race under the ownership of the most colorful General Benjamin Franklin Butler of Ipswich, MA, who had served as a top-ranking general through most of the Civil War. The New York Times reported that special trains and excursion steamers brought thousands to the region to watch.



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

Grim Announced as Next President and CEO of Strawbery Banke Museum

Strawbery Banke Museum announced recently that the board of trustees has appointed Linnea Grim as president and CEO, Thomas W. Haas Endowed Chair. Seacoast Eat Local Moves into New Space

SEACOAST -

Seacoast Eat Local (SEL) now resides in an office space at the working Tuckaway Farm in Lee. The three full-time and three part-time staff members primarily worked remotely or from a very small office in the Dover Mills.

Executive Director Shawn Menard had hopes for a larger space where the organization could park the Seacoast Area Mobile Market van (which brings local food to local people in need), store food and supplies, and meet in-person as a team and with food system partners.

The Cox family, who own Tuckaway Farm, were quick to offer space at the farm, especially since they had long envisioned being part of an ever-expanding food hub network across the state and region, including a farm store, commercial kitchen, grain mill, food handling and storage area, and a place where food and agricultural organizations could work together.

Menard research his options but finally decided the tobe-converted 1750s farmhouse at Tuckaway Farm would best suit the work they do in the local food system. The majority of 2022 was spent planning and accomplishing the renovations.

The new office is roughly 900 square feet of space, has exposed beams, a view of ducks in a pond and DeMeritt Hill Farm across the street. The ground floor of the house contains a large meeting room and kitchen for groups of 5-35 to collaborate or network. The foyer leads up to a second floor office.

Aside from the character of the building itself, there is much to admire about the surrounding property. There are event fields with parking for 100+ cars, and 300 acres of conservation land in active community agriculture. Volunteers of Gather can be seen in the fields, and Three River Farmers Alliance delivers regularly to the farm store.

An advanced directive, commonly referred to as a living will, is a legal document

that specifies what actions should be taken if a person is no longer able to make decisions for themselves – often because they have become seriously ill or otherwise incapacitated.

Those attending should bring their license, a list of proxies they would like to represent them, and contact information for all parties involved.

Public Pools and Spas Must Be Registered with State

STATEWIDE -

The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) is reminding owners and operators of public bathing facilities (PBFs) they are required by New Hampshire law to register all existing and new public pools or spas with the state, conduct an annual fee-based self-certification of each existing facility, and certify that the PBF is operated under the supervision of a certified pool operator.

The NHDES Public Pool and Spa Program uses the information provided in the mandatory registration to establish a database of PBFs, documenting contact information, basic physical specifications and circulation system details for each facility. An online registration form is now available at www.des. nh.gov/water/healthy-swimming/pools-and-spas.

The annual self-certification fee is \$250 per PBF (regardless of size) up to a maximum of \$1,500 annually for any facility that has more than six PBFs. It includes an annual compliance declaration that focuses on the practical aspects of public pool and spa operation such as: circulation, filter and disinfection system performance, daily water quality testing and record-keeping, presence of critical life-safety equipment, and facility maintenance. For seasonal facilities, the annual self-certification must be completed annually prior to reopening. The online form and payment instructions are also available (at website above).

All PBFs must operate

under the supervision of a certified pool operator (CPO). A CPO may be the owner or designee, an employee of the establishment where the PBF is located, or a contracted vendor. The CPO is responsible for training on-site personnel in the basics of daily operation, including but not limited to, water testing and record keeping, documenting operational issues, maintaining water quality/clarity, handling sanitizers and pool closure procedures. The CPO must personally visit the PBF at least once a week to ensure the pool is being operated in a safe and sanitary manner, and the CPO must be available by telephone to on-site personnel whenever not personally present. Certifications can be obtained from an approved training program dedicated to the operation of PBFs. To find an in-person or virtual training course offering in New Hampshire, visit the Pool & Hot Tub Alliance's website, www.phta.

Operation of a PBF by an owner/operator that has not met the three requirements outlined above (registration, self-certification and operation under supervision of a CPO) is a violation of state law. NHDES has initiated an outreach campaign to PBF owners and operators to educate them on the applicable laws and assist them with coming into compliance for 2023. NHDES encourages PBF owners and operators to complete this process as soon as possible. The Public Pool and Spa program will conduct inspections throughout the summer and fall to confirm compliance with the requirements outlined



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
